[Episode 2] Value-added mosquito repellent for malaria prevention using essential oil extracts from catnip and other plant species.

Episode Introduction:

Malaria is a life threatening disease, and 90% of the global population affected by malaria is in Sub-saharan Africa. With the emergence of antimalarial drug resistance, Prof. Tatien Masharabu and his team have been developing value-added natural mosquito repellent for malaria prevention using plant species available within the African biological diversity. For example, catnip is found to contain mosquito repellent characteristics and is used as a natural and safer alternative to synthetically derived chemicals which are harmful to the environment.

In this episode, Prof. Tatien will talk about his experience being involved in a project producing such plant-based malaria preventive products and how the project will create various opportunities to build a locally based value chain. *Read their project story: <u>URL</u>.
